
# Accomplishments 2007-08







**Supervised Offender Population (6/30/08)**



**Distribution of FY 2007-08 Probation Entries by Punishment Type**


- Intermediate - 23.3%

- Other - 7%




### Probation Population Year End Trend



### Parole/Post Release Population Year End Trend




### Top Five Probation Felony Crime Category Admissions



The chart above shows the five most frequently committed felony crimes for offenders received to probation supervision for FY 2007-2008, and the percent of total felony admissions they comprise. A total of 21,781 offenders were admitted to probation for felony crimes, slightly up from the FY 2006-2007 total of 18,549.

### Top Five Probation Misdemeanor Crime Category Admissions



DCC released over seventy-two thousand offenders from supervision during FY 2007-2008. The pie charts below illustrate the exit reasons by supervision type.





The line graph above shows the revocation trends for the past nine fiscal years for offenders under probation supervision versus parole/post release supervision. Probation revocations seemed to have become level in the past few years while parole/post release revocations have increased.
