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## UNC RE-ENTRY PROGRAM GRADUATES FIRST CLASS AT DURHAM CORRECTIONAL CENTER

The first offering of the "Education & Re-Entry" training program developed and conducted by Dr. James Johnson and Dr. Walter Farrell of the UNC-CH Kenan-Flagler Business School's Urban Investment Strategies Center was concluded February 7 at Durham Correctional Center with an impressive graduation ceremony and buffet dinner. Fourteen graduates were presented with certificates and recognized by their instructors for the progress they had made in completing the program, which is designed to prepare inmates for returning to the community and the workplace. Secretary Theodis Beck delivered the keynote address while DCC Superintendent David Cates gave special remarks. The program will be conducted next at Orange Correctional Center starting within the month.

### INMATE EDUCATION BY MAYLAND COMMUNITY COLLEGE NOTED IN NATIONAL PUBLICATION

The education programs conducted by Mayland Community College at Avery Mitchell Correctional Institution, Blue Ridge Youth Center, Buncombe Correctional Center, and Mt. View Correctional Institution are highlighted in an article appearing in the current issue of The Community College Times, along with a correctional facility on the west coast. The article describes the programs conducted by Mayland CC and in Oregon by Portland Community College to illustrate the involvement of community colleges in inmate education across the nation. In North Carolina, 45 community colleges provide on-site instruction at 72 prisons, which represents over 90 percent of all education programming conducted throughout Division of Prisons. Rick Garrett, vice president of instructional services at Mayland CC, is quoted in the article as saying, "We offer educational programs to prepare prisoners with skills so that upon release they become employable and contributing members of society."

The written request should include the following information: name, date of birth, social security number, year GED was received, and the name of the community college awarding the certificate.

### YOUTH OFFENDER PROGRAM SUCCESS STORY

An 18-year old graduate of the Youth Offender Program at Western Youth Institution was recently recognized during a workshop on "Stories of Inmates and Their Families Before and After Prison" held at NC State University. The young man, who is employed as an assistant manager at a food service business, said that the federally funded Youth Offender Program had helped to build his confidence in applying for work and in preparing him to answer questions about his past in the interview process. He said that the program had also given him the courage and know-how for continuing his education in the computer field. He was accompanied in making his presentation by the members of his family, who have been very supportive of him.

# JOHNSTON CI STUDENTS PASS STATE EXAM FOR REFRIGERATION CERTIFICATION

Fran Minshew, Program Director at Johnston Correctional Institution, reports that two students in the Heating/Ventilation/Air Conditioning and Refrigeration (HVACR) program at JCI recently received their technician certification after passing the State Board of Refrigeration/EPA Technical Certification examination. One student was awarded Type I&II certification while the other earned Universal certification. Throughout the past year, ten HVACR students at JCI have successfully taken the state exam as administered by the program instructor from Johnson Community College, A. J. Kay. JCI is one of many units throughout DOP that prepares its students to earn various forms of job-related credentials that enhance their chances for employment.

#### ROSE TRUE APPOINTED ESP COORDINATOR

The new coordinator of the Exceptional Students Program in Educational Services is Rose True, who had been serving as ESP compliance specialist since joining the central office staff last summer. In her new role, Ms. True will oversee the delivery of services to ESP students at the six youth facilities and will also continue to serve as compliance officer until that position is filled.

That education and training lead to employment for exoffenders was recently demonstrated by an inmate released from Harnett Correction Institution where he completed the welding program and earned certification from the American Welding Society. He is now working for an RTP-area firm.
